"We Are the Knights"

In the month of March, legislators start proposing and passing bills at our State Capitol. I'd like to give an update of what is going on in our Capitol. This year it seems the nightly local news has kept us updated well and opinions seem to be as different as the many different stakeholders we have in lowa. This is a good thing.

With many opinions comes many negatives and I even find myself unhappy at times with the direction a bill is going or the lack of speed in which a bill gets approved. The article mentioned below helps me remember we have more things in common than different, and the goals of all the stakeholders are much more alike than different too. This article helps us focus on communication with others - which in the end I strongly believe creates better outcomes and progress.

"Education conversations today are riddled with more landmines than ever before," issue-focused communications firm, RALLY, reports from recent conversations with superintendents, principals, teachers, parents, and youth advocates.



While this isn't news to most of us, these tips on working through these conversations may be informative. In their current work, the authors of the article "In Times of Division, Strategic Communication Matters", Ashley Burns and Manny Rivera, attend focus groups, analyze quantitative messaging research, and engage with different audiences online to help look across

the U.S. and communication channels to identify patterns and strategies for communications that work.

Message from Principal Horman

Professional Development

The changes we have made to our professional development for the second half of the school year have gone well. We have had Grant Wood staff and Melissa Scherkenbach going into teachers' classrooms during times they have requested to provide them individualized support in an area they have requested. The teachers are then provided feedback through email and given an opportunity to meet on our Wednesday afternoon professional development times to talk more specifically about the feedback. This cycle will continue unless we determine a need to bring staff back as a whole group to focus on a common topic that is noticed during observations.

We will also begin spending some professional development time looking at the changes to ISASP testing for this school year. Teachers and students will be spending time looking at rubrics and taking practice tests during the month of March to prepare to take the test the first week in April.

Testing

We finished our FAST testing and have been working on finishing all of our fast data meetings. The weather has made it very challenging to get these in, but we are almost done. These meetings are essential and allow multiple stakeholders to discuss our student data and determine the next steps for each class/student.

Academics

We have currently established the testing dates for the state ISASP tests. Those tests will be taken for 7-12th graders from April 3rd-7th. Our teachers are in the process of discussing next year's schedules with me and giving suggestions as to what courses they would like to offer/change for the next school year. It is my hope that we can have those offerings "finalized" in the next month or so. Our honor roll was released into the newspaper this past week as well, so you can see how many of our students are doing great in the classroom. NHS had their induction February 21st and that is obviously not all academic, but it was great to see how many of our students met the academic standards to be offered the opportunity to apply, and it was fun to acknowledge those students who were inducted into the ceremony.

Activities

Winter sports are now concluded. High school track and golf are the next sports to begin. Our initial look at spring sports numbers from sign up sheets looks very promising and hopefully a few more will go out once we get into the actual season. In talks with our spring sports coaches, they seem to have high hopes/expectations of the teams this spring.

We had elementary students come to the building February 28th to participate in an elementary concert during the day with some of our 7-12th grade music students. This is a fun way for the younger students to get involved and participate in music.

The play was held for March 3-5th in Clarence. The students worked hard towards the performance. We enjoyed the event.

Professional Development

Our groups have been working hard towards continued improvements in the building. Our PBIS team has now split into multiple tiered supports, and a couple employees went to a training at GWAEA that helped us build the model for our tier 2/tier 3 support system we have now created. This is a continued process, but the early feedback of this is that it is going well and great conversations are being had to fully develop this program. Our culture team has established some initial program goals, based on student feedback we received from a survey. Our initial focus will begin with some presentations to advisory's on bullying/harassment and the impact that it can have on other students, as well as themselves. Our third group, MTSS feels they have now done what they can do in regards to restructuring our academic support time during advisory and have shifted their focus to overall building academics. They had their first meeting with the new focus this past Wednesday. We are hopeful they can be the academic representatives of the building PD.

Culture Initiatives

We have been working towards continued improvements for overall school culture for students and staff at the building. We have decided to create a student of the month program, which highlights students who have gone above and beyond in a certain subject area each month. We are planning on beginning that at the end of this month. The plan is to spotlight these students in the building, as well as on social media for people to see. I have been calling a wide range of students to touch base with them regarding their current thoughts on culture and getting their input on what they feel needs to be a focus of improvement as well. Another thing we have done is send out a survey to all students 7-12 that asks a variety of questions about the current state of the building. We are using that information to assess the students views on the building and try to address their concerns with actions. In professional development with staff, we have started almost all of our meetings highlighting the positive things that are going on in our building and also highlighting successes of the teachers in our building each week. I believe this is a great reminder to our teachers of the good that they are doing each and every day.

Burns and Rivera find that four communication principles consistently help education and equity advocates navigate challenging waters, whether trying to de-escalate a situation with a concerned parent or convince colleagues to hold fast to their equity commitments. They note, "These principles transcend regional and political differences as well as urban, rural, and suburban contexts."

The following four communication principles are emphasized:

- 1. Ask thoughtful questions;
- 2. Lead with your values:

Every student should feel welcome in the classroom

Every student should be prepared for success beyond high school

Every school should prepare students to help create a better future

- 3. Seek common ground; and
- 4. Consider the context and choose the right messenger.

Whole Wheat Pizza Crust

Serves: 6 Cost/Serving: \$0.20 Serving Size: 1/6 pizza

INGREDIENTS

- 1 package (2 1/4 teaspoons) active dry yeast
- 1 cup warm water
- 2 teaspoons white sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons oil (canola, olive, vegetable)
- 1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
- 1 1/4 cups all purpose white flour (divided)

INSTRUCTIONS

- Add yeast and water to a large bowl. Stir to dissolve yeast in water. Allow to rest for 5 minutes
- 2 Stir in sugar, salt, and oil.
- 3 Stir in whole wheat flour and 1 cup white flour.
- Sprinkle remaining flour onto a clean work surface. Place dough on top of the floured work surface. Knead until the flour is completely mixed in with the dough, about 5 minutes. Form the dough into a ball.
- Spray the bowl with nonstick cooking spray. Set the ball of dough in the bowl. Cover with a towel. Let it rise in a warm, draft free place for 15 minutes.
- 6 Preheat oven to 425°F.
- Spray a pizza pan or cookie sheet with nonstick cooking spray. Stretch the pizza dough to fit the pan. Using a fork, prick the dough 10-15 times.
- Bake the crust for 6-8 minutes or until it begins to feel firm on top. Top as desired and bake 10-12 minutes more or until outer crust is lightly brown.
