# Superintendent Dohmen's Message

We are welcoming the 2024 calendar and putting 2023 behind us. It is a good time to think about what education will look like in the new year. To start this conversation off I want to share information on the upcoming legislative session.

The legislative session officially begins January 8. Needless to say, it could be an "interesting" session with modest economic growth and uncertainty due to inflation and property tax relief. I feel like a broken record because I feel we were in a very similar situation last year at this time minus the COVID-19 relief funds which benefited the district greatly the previous two years. North Cedar has shared information with legislators that may help them better understand issues that may have an impact on North Cedar schools, students, and our communities.



Public education is the foundation of our democratic society and the keys to successful futures for Iowa children. Quality public schools strengthen our communities and are the cornerstone of any sound economic development policy. The state and voters must put public education first and provide sufficient funding and support services to provide all students with the best education. With voters voting down by 22 votes our Physical Plant and Equipment Levy (PPEL), I stress the importance of our local schools for our children and communities. Communities without schools do not thrive. Only three schools in the state of Iowa voted down this levy this Fall. I will speak more on the impact of the loss of the PPEL in February's newsletter, but want to focus on the 2023-2024 legislative priorities for North Cedar School District in this newsletter.

# **Mental Health**

Student mental health issues are increasing and impacting student achievement. To address these concerns, we support state policies that would establish comprehensive school and community mental health systems to offer preventative and treatment services to:

- Increase access to in-school and telehealth services.
- Increase access to mental health professionals via in-person or telehealth visits.
- Improve awareness and understanding of child emotional and mental health needs through ongoing teacher, administrator, and support staff training.
- Integrated suicide prevention and coping skills into existing curriculum.
- Support the mental health needs of educators and staff.
- Provide a comprehensive mental health resources clearinghouse for schools and community providers.

- Expand training that includes a referral plan for continuing action provided by mental health professionals outside of the school district.
- Designate a categorical funding stream for mental health professionals serving students and ongoing teacher, administrator, and support staff mental health training.
- Support development of the mental health workforce to provide services to children.

Since I started in education in 2001, schools have been forced to take on and deal with the needs of mental health more and more with every year that I have been in the profession. With COVID-19 funding, we were able to incorporate needed staff into our schools to help with these mental health concerns. With this funding no longer available, schools are forced with choices of mental health or program cuts.

#### **Teacher Professional Development and Retention**

Developing effective teachers and keeping them in every lowa school district is crucial to student success and can be supported through state policies that:

- Provide teacher leadership and quality professional development programs.
- Provide beginning teacher mentoring programs.
- Use the management fund to offer retention incentives to maintain a high-quality teacher workforce.
- Allow flexibility and resources to pay school staff market competitive wages.
- Provide resources to school districts for ongoing cultural competency training.

Bringing new, talented teachers into our district and communities is one of my favorite parts of my job. However, every year we lose one or two because we can't compete with a competitive wage compared to the nearby larger districts and the private sector. Keeping these teachers is not just a game changer for our classrooms, but also for our communities. Paying a competitive wage allows them to buy a house here and many times make a life in our community.

#### **Supplemental State Aid**

The school aid formula is the biggest driver in providing resources for a high-quality education that translates to a successful future for our students and economic growth in our state. A school's general fund supports a high-quality teacher workforce, critical for student achievement. We support state policies on supplemental state aid rate that:

- Sufficiently supports the ability of local districts to meet parent and community expectations and provide a world-class education for all students.
- Provide the resources to recruit and retain a high-quality teacher and staff workforce.

• Incorporate inflation and cost-of-living increase to minimize the negative impact on a district's general fund from these increased costs. About 80% of our budget is staffing, so after multiple years of 3% or lower state aid and a decline in enrollment, inflation this past two years has had a big impact on our school. Iowa chose to put the one room schoolhouse on our state quarter for a reason. Education is a core value in lowa and we need to fund it for our students and communities.

These priorities will guide many of our efforts for conversations with legislators this session and serve as a road map for our work.

Thank you for all your efforts in working with North Cedar schools. I assure you that it has a lasting impact on our young people across the district. Please don't ever hesitate to contact me if I can be of any assistance.
